"History of the Crypto-Jews in New Mexico" **EMHS Sponsors Free Public Talk Saturday By** Former State Historian Stanley M. Hordes

The 500-year-old survival of Jewish traditions, practiced in secret by those who fled the Inquisitions of Mexico and Spain into New Mexico, will be explored at 2:30 p.m. Saturday, Aug. 12 by former State Historian Stanley M. Hordes.

The event, free and open to the public, will be held in the Tijeras Public Library, and is sponsored by the East Mountain Historical Society.

Hordes began to research early crypto-Jewish settlers of Mexico and New Mexico in 1981, while he was state historian, after hearing stories of Hispanic New Mexicans who lit candles on Friday night and abstained from eating pork. The result was his book, "To the End of the Earth: A History of the Crypto-Jews of New Mexico."

Hordes reviewed biographies of colonial officials accused of secretly practicing Judaism, family histories, Inquisition records, letters, and other primary sources to create his book. An adjunct research professor at the Latin American and Iberian Institute at the University of New Mexico, Hordes has a Ph.D. in Colonial Mexican History and is author of numerous articles on the history of crypto-Judaism in Mexico and the U.S. Southwest. He has also written "Historical Markers in New Mexico" and the "New Mexico Directory of Historians and Historical Organizations."
