Historical Photographs, Map on Display Sept. 23


2019 Then & Now Calendar Also Will Debut at Official EMHS Open House

The East Mountain Historical Society will display its photographic exhibit of East Mountain villages and how they have looked over the last century during an Open House, to be held from noon to 4 p.m. Sunday, Sept. 23, at the historic church in Tijeras. The event is free and open to the public.

The Open House is scheduled to coincide with the East Mountain Celebration hosted by the county during those same hours across the street at Los Vecinos Community Center.

The public is invited to come by the church, next to the East Mountain Library, to view the historic photographs and to see our popular six-by-six-foot map of disappearing and past East Mountain villages and landmarks, which until this month has been on display at the Main Library in Downtown Albuquerque. Refreshments will be served as we also celebrate publication of our new 2019 East



poster or folded, with actual vintage advertisements for East Mountain businesses printed on the back.

Members of the historical society will be on hand to talk about East Mountain history and describe our all-volunteer preservation efforts. It's also an opportunity to buy our Route 66 vintage reproduction postcards, booklets on East Mountain history, past calendars (each year featuring different then-and-now photos) and turquoise T-shirts featuring the EMHS logo.

Church parking is available at the library and senior center. Across the street, the East Mountain Celebration will offer live music, a car show, local vendors and food trucks. Designated parking for that event is at A. Montoya Elementary and Roosevelt Middle schools.

Librarian Lisa Kindrick's E. Mtn. Connection


Lisa Kindrick, librarian at the Main Library's Genealogy Center (right), was happy to have our map at the center over the summer. She advertised it on facebook and the library web site and said many people spent time looking at the map. Among them: her father, Joe Paul Kindrick, born near what is now Edgewood. "My father has Venus, New Mexico, on his birth certificate, which was the nearest post office to his home at the time in 1931. My grandparents, Sam and Bessie Kindrick, had six children and grew pinto beans and had a small dairy near Edgewood. Their house was on the north side of Route 66. My father remembers many of the landmarks on the map and enjoyed roaming the hills in the area looking for arrowheads, interesting rocks, and observing the wildlife. I gave him a copy of the map and oral histories from the



East Mountain Historical Society for his birthday last year and it's brought up a lot of memories for him."

Did You Know...

...the origin of today's Sandia Crest sign?



For the September pages of our new 2019 *Then and Now* calendar, EMHS member and calendar organizer extraordinaire **Rick Holben** paired a photo of the 1950s directional sign for Sandia Crest with the shot he took of the sign that sits at the Triangle turnoff today.

Those familiar with the style of artist Ross Ward – who for decades designed and painted nearly every sign on NM-14 between I-40 and Madrid – might recognize Ross' handiwork, and not be surprised to know that Ross designed and carved the sign leading to the Crest today. As his widow, EMHS member Carla Ward of Tinkertown, confirmed:

Not only did Ross design the sign but he hand-carved it and we paid for the whole project ourselves, with the help of Sherry Perry from the Sandia Crest House who

raised about \$200 for its construction. Sam Nelson used his plasma cutter; Ross created the cutouts. PNM helped install it with Ross' supervision.

It was all done with very little fanfare but it is a mighty sign!!

It was all done in 1988 ... when (then-Sandia District Ranger) Floyd Thomson got the Forest Service to designate the road to Sandia Crest as a National Forest Scenic Byway – different from the National Scenic Byway Designation we (the Turquoise Trail Association) obtained for the Turquoise Trail through the Federal Highway and Transportation Department in 2000.

The Friends of the Sandias volunteer group maintains the sign beautifully because they repaint it every couple of years!

We are greatly saddened to report the loss of four honorary members this summer. Honorary status is bestowed on those interested in membership who have lived in the East Mountains 50 years or more.

Former EMHS board member and beloved field trip traveling companion Margaret Geneva Garcia died July 22 at the age of 71, which was a shock and surprise to all of us on the board. She was born in Carnuel and has been buried in the old Carnuel Cemetery. Margaret graduated from the University of New Mexico with her Bachelors and Master's Degrees in Elementary Education, and followed her passion by teaching children at Roosevelt Elementary School in Gallup before returning to the East Mountains.
